Casa Batlló

Antoni Gaudi's work full of colourful mosaics and glass and ceramic elements.



La Pedrera

Casa Milà, popularly known as La Pedrera, is a work by Antoni Gaudí, built between 1906 and 1912 and declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1984.



Joan Miro Park

Popularly known as "Parc de l'Escorxador" or Slaughterhouse Park, after the municipal facility that previously occupied it, this space dedicated to Joan Miró is home to one of his most famous sculptures, which the artist specifically created to welcome travellers arriving by train.



Plaça d'Espanya

This square designed by Puig i Cadafalch is where Montjuïc mountain meets the Sants and Poble-sec distric.



MNAC

Museu Nacional d'Art de Catalunya

MNAC brings together a collection spanning a thousand years of art history in Catalonia and lets you see art from ancient times to modern days






Columbus Monument

The monument in homage to the explorer Christopher Columbus is erected in front of the port of Barcelona between La Rambla and Passeig de Colom.



Palau Guell

Antoni Gaudi's first major work, where he experimented with some of his most characteristic building elements.



Barcelona Cathedral

It is home to relics of Saint Eulalia, Barcelona's patron saint, and one of Catalan Gothic's most beautiful cloisters.



Plaça Reial

The square was built in the middle of the 19th century on a plot left empty when the Capuchin Convent of Saint Matrona was demolished as a result of the Spanish confiscation in 1835.



Plaça de Catalunya

Plaça de Catalunya is the most central and largest of Barcelona's squares. Plaça de Catalunya is the origin of some of the city's main thoroughfares, including La Rambla, Passeig de Gràcia and Rambla de Catalunya, and metro, railway and bus lines run through and under it.



La Rambla

La Rambla is undeniably
Barcelona's best-known street.
Located in the historic centre
of the city, it connects
Barcelona's Port Vell (old
harbour) to Placa de Catalunya.
Its flower kiosks, performers,
museums, historic buildings and
numerous cafés fill it with life
from dawn to the small hours of
the night.

La Boqueria Market

La Boqueria is the city's oldest market. It was inaugurated in 1840, but its origins date back to the 13th century. At the almost 300 stalls distributed over a surface area of some 2,583 m² you can buy products from all over the world. A visit to the city's oldest market is an absolute must.

A famous park in Barcelona full of intersting forms characteristic for Catalonian architecture.





Las Sagrada Familia


A symbol of Catalan architecture. The most imposing church bulding in Barcelona.
